THE CHAIRPERSON: It is November 19, 2014 1 meeting of Sullivan's Island Design Review Board. 2 It's now 6:00. Members in attendance are Duke 3 Wright, Pat Ilderton, Steve Herlong, Mark Howard, 4 Rhonda Sanders, and Billy Craver. We have everybody, 5 right? 6 The Freedom of Information requirements 7 have been met for this meeting. The items on 8 tonight's agenda are approval of minutes. Everybody 9 seen the minutes? 10 MR. WRIGHT: So moved. 11 MR. CRAVER: Second. 12 Everybody in favor? THE CHAIRPERSON: 13 (Aves were stated by all board members.) 14 THE CHAIRPERSON: Cafe Medley parking 15 16 plan. MR. HENDERSON: If I could, just jump in 17 and give a quick run-down on this process. This is 18 not our typical meeting where we have design reviews. 19 It's actually a separate process of the ordinance. 20 On your agenda, it should say review of commercial 21 district parking plans or something to that effect. 22 If I could direct your attention up to the 23 screen here, the requirements for review parking 24 plans stated in Section 21-143-D of the zoning 25

ordinance, kind of hard to read, but essentially this section states: Any commercial business that changes its use and requires an increase in parking demand has to be reviewed by this board and given approval.

So that's what we're doing tonight.

There's some standards for review. So the applicant should demonstrate how their parking is going to be accommodated, how they're going to accommodate for the new spaces on their lot, how they're going to provide on-street parking for the increased use of their business. And they are to propose or show you some renderings of where these parking spaces are going to be.

In addition to that, they have to meet the design requirements. Essentially, they have to have wheel stops. They have to be a minimum of 18 feet in length by nine feet wide. So these are all standards that are typical of parking areas.

Are there any questions about what we have to do tonight?

MS. SANDERS: I have a question. What is the change other than our application, our enforcement and the title of the business?

MR. HENDERSON: Well, what town council has done is they've created a new land use

designation.

MS. SANDERS: The businesses themselves aren't really changing; it's just what town council is defining.

MR. HENDERSON: That's right. It's a technical change. Well, actually they are changing. It's a technical change. You're right. So they're converting from their current retail uses, their retail carry-out uses to a dine-in establishment. They're increasing the intensity of their use. That's why we have to review, make sure they're accommodating the parking.

Now, we understand they may not be changing too much.

MS. SANDERS: Is the use really changing?

MR. HENDERSON: Yes. We are going to -they've been given a special exception to operate as
a coffee shop. And if their parking plans are
approved by this board, then we will issue them a new
business license for a brand new use under that
special exception.

MS. SANDERS: If I walk in there today, is it any different than it was a year ago?

MR. HENDERSON: For one of these, probably. But we'll get to that. We'll go through

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1	how they're going to change.
2	Mr. Chairman, I'll turn it over to you.
3	THE CHAIRPERSON: I guess I need to recuse
4	myself. I'll turn it over to Steve.
5	MS. SANDERS: Are we going to have to
6	recuse ourselves because we all drink coffee?
7	MR. ILDERTON: I'll let y'all figure it
8	out, and I'll go.
9	MS. SANDERS: I'm just kidding.
10	VICE CHAIRPERSON: Joe, what we're going
11	to be doing is going through a process where there
12	will be applicants talking to us. And then you'll
13	follow-up; the normal process.
14	MR. HENDERSON: Yes. What I've done, I've
15	provided kind of a synopsis of their submittal, their
16	application. I'll provide photographs and renderings
17	that they've submitted under this application showing
18	how they're going to provide the increased parking
19	for their use.
20	VICE CHAIRPERSON: We're going to do this
21	for both applications?
22	MR. HENDERSON: That's correct.
23	VICE CHAIRPERSON: We'll do Cafe Medley
24	first, and then Co-op second?
25	MR. HENDERSON: Yes, sir.

VICE CHAIRPERSON: Okay. We're speaking about Cafe Medley first. And do you specifically have anything to tell us about the Cafe Medley application?

MR. HENDERSON: Yes, I do.

CAFE MEDLEY

MR. HENDERSON: This is agenda item C1. Cafe Medley is requesting review and approval of their parking plan to operate coffee shop use in a commercial zoning district and requested under Section 21-143-D(1)(c) of the zoning ordinance.

The applicants are -- so this property is located at 2213-C Middle Street. The applicants were originally issued a business license in 2009 to operate as a delicatessen use. They're converting from this use to a coffee shop. Again, they were given the special exception by the Board of Zoning Appeals on October 9th, and the DRB is required to essentially review their parking plan.

And what I'll do is go through and point out the map and also photographs. And I can turn it back over to you. And I would direct the applicant to describe what he stated in his application.

VICE CHAIRPERSON: You're ready to turn it

over now.

MR. HENDERSON: Yes, sir.

VICE CHAIRPERSON: Let's have the applicant's presentation.

MR. HARRIS: I'm Andrew Harris, owner of Cafe Medley. Rhonda is correct, we have been in operation for six years. The official use, as far as zoning, is changing dramatically from a take-out only designation to an on-premise dining designation of the Cafe; therefore, with the seating requirements and everything with the zoning, we have on-site, we have eight; offsite -- we have eight on-site parking spaces and two handicap, which are bottom right photograph and bottom left photograph. If it's easier, I have both of those right here.

There's a lot between High Thyme, the building of 2213-C which is High Thyme, Cafe Medley and Body Garden. Between that building and the building next door, which is Taco Mamacita. Right in the middle, that green, where it says eight, those are eight private spaces for the building that we are in.

We also have, I believe, six spaces out front, directly in front of the business, in front of the building. Those are street public parking.

And from a study that Joe Henderson did

late summer of last year, I believe, there are no less than 464 public parking spaces within two blocks of our location. There's ample parking for a location that has 24 seats.

VICE CHAIRPERSON: Okay.

MR. HARRIS: If there's any more specific where these spaces are located is needed, I have the map here. Joe has a similar map up there. That's it.

A majority of our patrons do walk, bike or golf cart to our location either way. Like I said, there's eight on-site; six in front, two handicaps, and 464 within two blocks.

MR. HOWARD: You're saying you have a map of 464 parking spaces?

MR. HARRIS: Each of the green are public spaces. Joe did a parking study, I guess, within two blocks of the business district for something else. I don't believe it was for this; for something else last year. And this was what he came up with.

MR. HENDERSON: Could you elaborate a little bit on the time that these eight spaces will be available, how your business operates with availability.

MR. HARRIS: We operate 7:00 in the

morning until 8:00 in the winter; 9:00 at night during the summer. Our peak business times are about 7:00 a.m. until about 10:30 a.m. in the morning. Then it slows down dramatically. We are the only business open before 10:00 in the morning, seven days a week, other than the co-op. They're on the other side of the business district.

The on-site spaces that are the eight spaces right there between Taco Mamacita and High Thyme are exclusively used by our patrons prior to 10:30, 11:00 when the other two businesses -- or when Mamacita opens. And High Thyme is only open for brunch on Sundays; otherwise they open at 5:00 the rest of the week.

On-street parking predominantly, and I have some photos to show this as well. Friday, at 9:00 in the morning, look up and down Middle Street, especially the north end of Station 22-and-a-half on Middle Street, you'll see very empty parking areas. So the public on-street spaces are predominantly used -- or unused during this time, used by our patrons. Unused by everybody else.

Anything else, Joe? I think the only other thing I touched on were -- no, that's pretty much it.

MR. HENDERSON: At any one time you have 1 possibly maybe two to three employees inside the 2 3 establishment. The most we'll have at any MR. HARRIS: 4 given time inside is four, maximum five. That fifth 5 person in summertime is generally high school student 6 that walks or bikes, does not drive. 7 Our staff has been instructed to park 8 along Middle or I'on on the north side of 9 22-and-a-half in the public on-street parking spaces. 10 That leaves the on-site and the spaces directly on 11 Middle Street in front of the cafe for Cafe Medley 12 13 patrons. Like right now there's one employee at the 14 During peak hours for other businesses in the 15 business district, we will rarely have more than two 16 employees in the cafe after 3:00 in the afternoon. 17 Standby. We have a VICE CHAIRPERSON: 18 couple of other items to cover. Is there any public 19 20 comment? Public comment session is closed. Joe, do 21 22 you have any final comments? MR. HENDERSON: Nothing further. 23 VICE CHAIRPERSON: Billy, would you like 24

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to have any comment?

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1	MR. CRAVER: Seems like his times when he
2	needs the parking is ideally matched up when the rest

9	parking need and availability. And congratulations.
10	MR. HARRIS: Thank you. Need more parking
11	at the house now. I get to buy a minivan now.
12	MS. KENYON: Boy or girl?
13	MR. HARRIS: We're going to be surprised.
14	MS. KENYON: When?

16	MR. HOWARD: Joe, actually my question is

MR. HENDERSON: No, it doesn't. The 1 zoning ordinance doesn't have a parking ratio 2 required for, I guess, a parking space per number of 3 seats, which is typical in larger jurisdictions. 4 see there's a hard-and-fast parking ratio. That was 5 removed from the zoning ordinance probably five years 6 ago, I think maybe 2005. 7 The only requirement for the increased in 8 intensity for any commercial use is that the Design 9 Review Board review it and makes sure that they 10 thought this through and accommodated for the use. 11 VICE CHAIRPERSON: Duke. 12 MR. WRIGHT: I'm fine with it. No 13 14 comment. VICE CHAIRPERSON: I am as well. As Billy 15 said, your bigger demand is when the other businesses 16 are not even opening yet. It's perfect match, quite 17 Do I hear a motion? honestly. 18 Move we approve the request. MR. CRAVER: 19 MR. WRIGHT: Second. 20 VICE CHAIRPERSON: Any discussion of the 21 motion? All in favor say aye. 22 (Ayes were stated by all board members.) 23 VICE CHAIRPERSON: That's all in favor. 24 MR. WRIGHT: Put me down for a cup of 25

coffee. We can't do anything about parking anyway.

MR. HOWARD: Can't create land.

MR. WRIGHT: We can put up a parking lot.

CO-OP PROVISIONS and DELICATESSEN

VICE CHAIRPERSON: Moving on to the Co-op Provisions and Delicatessen.

MR. HENDERSON: This is agenda item C2, Co-op Provisions and Delicatessen. The applicants are requesting review and approval of their proposed parking plan to operate a coffee shop in accordance with Section 21-143-D(1)(c) of the ordinance.

This property is located at 2019 Middle Street. The applicants are converting their current use to grocery or mercantile use to the dine-in establishment of the coffee shop. The BZA issued this special exception on October 9th as well.

Different from our previous review, the Board of Zoning Appeals required the applicants to, I guess, implement four criteria for site development issues. And the first of these is that they must accommodate the site with one accessible ADA space, with an unloading aisle and signage.

This property currently doesn't have an ADA space. And it's a federal law that town staff require that any change of use, we try and get this

accessible space for all commercial uses. 1 In addition to that, they must maintain 2 separation between the parking space and the proposed 3 outdoor patio area. Currently, there are bollards 4 This is something that the DRB may want out front. 5 to review as well. 6 In addition, they have to place wheel 7 stops to meet the ordinance regulations for the ADA 8 space and all other spaces out front. 9 Also, any elevation modifications to the 10 front of the establishment have to be reviewed by 11 you-all through this process. 12 With that, I'll turn it over to you, 13 Mr. Chairman. 14 THE CHAIRPERSON: Ron. 15 MR. COISH: Ron Coish, contractor, 16 representing Jessie Patterson. Did Joe give you 17 pictures? 18 First of all, the parking, as you can see 19 by the photos, we did a little sketch on the grounds.

MR. HENDERSON: Yes, sir.

Joe, could I have your pointer.

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This is the handicapped MR. COISH: walkway right here. And this being the handicapped So they'll be able to pull right up, go parking.

right in.

This parking space right here, right there is the one right beside Sullivan's. That will be used for golf cart and bicycles. And they're going to be -- hopefully, Joe is going to get us a bike rack. We'll see.

MR. HENDERSON: We're working on that.

MR. COISH: There's going to be a bike rack going right there.

The one thing we noticed about the co-op, you see how they park. It's unbelievable. Kids come in there with golf carts, it's just a real mess.

Since we put the lines, I'd say 99 out of 100 cars --

THE CHAIRPERSON: Park right on the line.

MR. COISH: One person had to go up and say: You're touching the line here. It's been a big help. I went ahead and marked them all the way down, see if we can get the whole front of the building marked. It kind of looks nice, and it takes options away from people parking cars. When they're texting and trying to turn into the Co-op to get a coffee, they don't have to worry about where they're parked. They'll see the parking lines. That's about it for that.

And the elevation. This is really the

only change. This is little mockup we made and attached to the outside. And that's where seven of the 25 new seats will go. This is the door. It's 16 inches. You have four feet between these posts in here. It gives you plenty of room. Quite comfortable actually. It would be the elevation and parking plan.

THE CHAIRPERSON: Great, thank you. Is there any other comments on this application?

Joe, anything else to add?

MR. HENDERSON: I was going to point out right here, the original, I guess, ADA space was going to be here. The parking space is coming in here with the unloading aisle directly in front of the door. But it was very close to where these existing seats are. They switched that over. In doing that, this was only, I guess, suitable for bike parking and maybe a golf cart parking area.

I think that the rack may go somewhere here. You want to identify that space somehow with some kind of pavement markings or, I don't know, planters or something to keep folks from pulling in there.

I would just maybe, Ron, the owners might want to keep that open, something needs to be placed

MR. HOWARD: Ron, we met on-site. We had talked briefly about increasing the lighting under the awning. Is that still feasible?

MR. COISH: That's feasible. That will create the nice lighting. Mark was a little concerned, when you drive up, you see the lights on Sullivan's. And the Co-op does have lights but it's not a fancy lighting system. We're going to go ahead and put --

THE CHAIRPERSON: Little more definition.

MR. COISH: And pointing down, too.

MR. HENDERSON: If I could point something out along those lines, all of these lights, illuminating signs for all of these spaces are completely different. They're kind of off-the-shelf, Lowe's-type spotlights. Some are LED. And you can see the conduit along here. Typically you have kind of more decorative fixtures that blend in with the facade or even goose neck lights for storefront. I mean, I know you guys were talking about making some improvements along those lines.

MR. COISH: We're going to definitely improve the lighting.

MR. HOWARD: The point I wanted to make about the lighting, keep it under the awning so as not to disturb the residential across the street. I do think even doing that would light up where the outdoor dining is, and that's a safety issue.

I was even thinking to the point the bollards are a dark green and lighting it would not change the color of the bollards, would help light up the fact we have metal poles here. You're going to have concrete bumpers, right?

MR. COISH: Curb stop. Off the cuff, should those bollards be continued in the color of


