Sarah Diaz, 1325 Middle Street- stated that removing the underbrush could have a detrimental impact on insect population as well as bird population which will throw off the balance of the ecosystem.

Mike Walsh, 2530 I'On Avenue- gave a brief report regarding Battery Gadsden Cultural Center. Mr. Walsh also thanked the Town for their support with the Osceola's Muse Theatrical Production.

Roy Williams, 2513 I'On Avenue- stated that we live in an era of rising sea levels, sinking land and more frequent and intense hurricanes. Mr. Williams added that thick vegetation is needed to help stop tidal surge and opposes any cutting.

Mark Howard, 1820 Central Avenue- stated that in 1991, a previous Council voted to save the maritime forest. Mr. Howard asked Council to have the same foresight and vote to preserve and protect this land.

Tracy Knisley Hahn, 2662 I'On Avenue- stated that barrier islands are not stable landforms and supports leaving the maritime forest as is.

Howard Holl, 1808 Atlantic Avenue- stated he supports the preservation of the vegetation of the Accreted Land for protection, beauty and for the future of the island.

Rob Byko, 2862 Middle Street- asked Council a number of questions regarding money for ongoing maintenance in the Accreted Land and to perform the new scope of work.

Karen Byko, 2862 Middle Street- urged Council to create a community wide resilience plan and to preserve the natural state of the Accreted Land and maritime forest.

Larry Middaugh, 2420 Raven Drive- expressed concerns regarding the deed of the protected RC-1 area.

Nathaniel Hoyt, 1724 I'On Avenue- supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Courtney Somers, 2520 Myrtle Avenue- read a letter from Pat Votava who resides at 2214 Jasper Boulevard. Ms. Votava supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Amy Hoyt, 1724 I'On Avenue- supports protecting the forest and hopes it will remain in its natural and untouched state.

Samantha Siegel, Charleston- urged Council to reconsider making changes to the Accreted Land plan. Ms. Siegel added that the land benefits all of the residents of Sullivan's Island and the Charleston area.

Heidi Brown, 405 Station 22 Street- stated that the conservation easement was created to preserve the forest barrier for the whole islands' protection during severe weather occurrences. Ms. Brown supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Seth Fisher, 405 Station 22 Street- stated he is against any taxpayer's dollars being spent on this new plan and supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Lana Duncan, 3109 Middle Street- agrees with all previous comments regarding preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

John Winchester, 2720 Brooks Street- supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Susan Middaugh, 2420 Raven Drive- gave Council a handout. Ms. Middaugh supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Linda Perkis, 2871 Brownell Avenue- supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest. Ms. Perkis stated that her end of the island was severely hit during Hurricane Hugo primarily due to not having the Accreted Land to protect them.

Nancy Carroll Geckler, 1602 Atlantic Avenue- stated that she grew up living in Aiken during the winter and Sullivan's Island during the summer. She just had her 75th summer on the island. Ms. Geckler suggested working with Hitchcock Woods Foundation plan in Aiken.

Larry Kobrovsky, 402 Seabreeze Lane- stated that the maritime forest is a gift from God and is the best thing to happen to the island. Mr. Kobrovsky supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Barbara Spell, 1702 Atlantic Avenue- stated that there are 77 beach front homes and approximately 900 homes that are not beach front. What happens on the Accreted Land affects those 900 homes especially in terms of resiliency. Ms. Spell asked Council to vote against the motion and to engage in an open, deliberate and careful process of managing the irreplaceable and invaluable resource.

Alice Morrisey, 1652 Thompson Avenue- sang a song to save paradise and supports preserving and protecting the maritime forest.

Tippy Brickman, Station 26.5- stated that Council was voted into office to get rid of the non-indigenous post-Hugo growth that is full of coyotes, rats, snakes and poison ivy. Ms. Brickman added she has never seen one person stroll through the maritime forest because it is filled with rats, snakes and garbage. She urged Council to not slow down the process.

Councilmember Sarah Church stated that Council has not had a really clear scope of work that Council has had an opportunity to discuss and develop. She added that during the September 17, 2019 Council meeting, a motion amendment was passed stating that Council would have input on the team, scope of work and the method of engagement and to date that has not happened.

Councilmember Kaye Smith stated that on September 19, 2019, Mayor Pro-Tem Clark sent a letter to Council asking for input on recommendations for the team. The only response Mr. Clark received was for Jeff Jackson of Lowcountry Roots, LLC.

Councilmember Tim Reese stated that he has reviewed the team and their bios and based on what he read he has no issue with them moving forward.

Councilmember Sarah Church read an insert from the Accreted Land Management Plan prepared by Coastal Science & Engineering dated July 2010 (located on the Town's website). On page 167 it states: "Manipulation of topography should be avoided in favor of vegetation management based on the consensus of the community". Ms. Church stated that this issue will not be put to rest without some level of consensus of the community.

Councilmember Tim Reese read the following insert from the 'Intent, Scope and Limitations of the Management Plan' from Draft #3A: "This plan is not expected to be so prescribes or detailed as to constitute in and of itself a specific directive from which implementation may flow directly. Rather, it is intended to provide a clear guide to the objectives and approaches the Town intends to achieve and utilize, respectively, in its management of this land. Therefore, it is expected that the Town will engage appropriately trained professionals to translate the management plan objectives and approaches into detailed plans, which will be accessible to all Town citizens. These detailed plans would be the blueprints that the Town would cause to be executed under appropriate direction". Mr. Reese stated that his intent is neither to make the land a park nor to leave it alone but rather alternative #3 which is what the majority of the citizens wanted to be looked at according to the survey.

Councilmember Bachman Smith, IV asked how the second half of the proposed motion flows with what Councilmember Reese just quoted from Draft #3A. Councilmember Greg Hammond read the following objectives from the Sullivan's Island Comprehensive Plan: "Completing the Sullivan's Island Accreted Land Management Plan with the broadest possible community participation and input, as an integral part of the Town's resiliency plan" and "Completing the Accreted Land Management Plan as an integral part of the Town's comprehensive sea-level rise and resiliency strategy." Mayor O'Neil stated that is he still unsure what the objective and purpose is. He believes Council has not had the chance to properly discuss the project.

Councilmember Sarah Church asked Councilmember Reese if he is willing to take alternative #4 off the table because that was the intention was of Draft #3A and if Council is working with Draft #3A Council is agreeing that it will not include any recommendation for construction of any dunes, burns or levy's with the exception of placement of sand fences.
